**Presenter Biography**

**Trudy Gregorie** has 27 years of experience in the crime victim services and criminal/juvenile justice fields. For more than a decade, she was director of a prosecutor-based program providing comprehensive victim services in Charleston, S.C. She served on the initial South Carolina task force that developed statewide policies, procedures, and standards for victim services. She was a founding member, and officer of the South Carolina Victim Assistance Network. In 1992, she joined the Governor's Office and developed the State Crime Victim Ombudsman Program. In 1994, Gregorie joined the senior staff of the National Center for Victims of Crime and served for seven years as Director of both victim services and training. Currently, she is a senior director with Justice Solutions, a national non-profit organization in Washington, D.C., which provides consulting, training, and technical assistance on criminal/juvenile justice and crime victim issues. For seven years she served as director of the Promising Practices and Strategies for Victim Services in Corrections project, sponsored by the Office for Victims of Crime, U.S. Department of Justice.

As a certified trainer, Gregorie has conducted numerous training sessions on victim rights and services for criminal/juvenile justice and victim professionals around the country. She was the founding director of the Stalking Resource Center at the National Center for Victims of Crime. She serves on the faculty of the National Victim Assistance Academy and the National Sheriffs' TRIAD Academy. She is a founding member of the Board of Directors for the National Association of Triads and is an elected member of the Board of Directors of the National Committee for the Prevention of Elder Abuse. Since 1996, Gregorie has served on the editorial board of the *Sexual Assault Report*. In 1999, she was awarded the National Crime Victim Services Award by the U.S. Attorney General. She was the first elected Crime Victim Representative on the Delegate Assembly of the American Correctional Association (ACA), and served three terms. She serves as co-chair of the ACA's Victims and Restorative Justice Committee and is a member of the American Probation and Parole Association Victim Issues Committee.
