CALL FOR PRESENTERS



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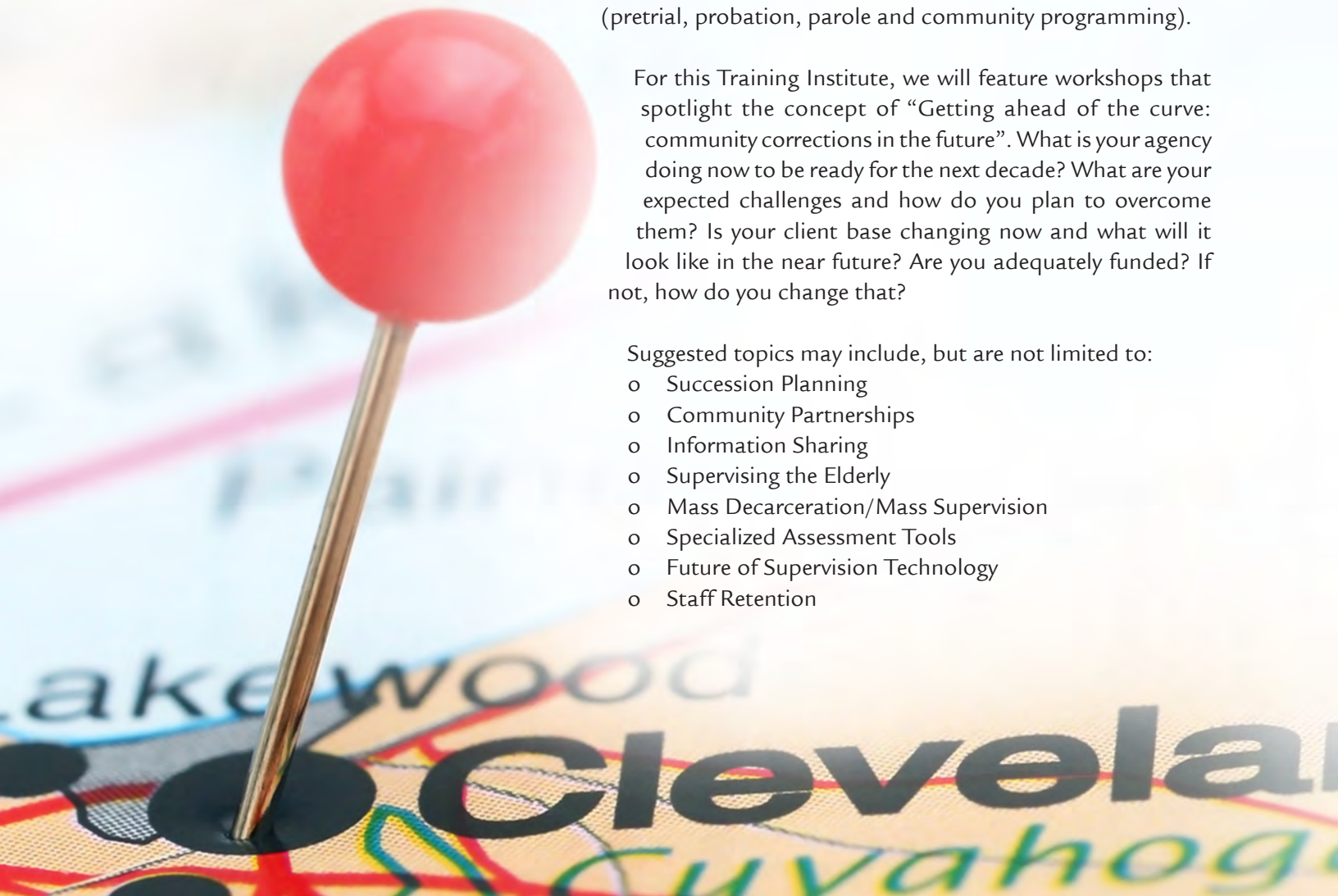
The American Probation and Parole Association is pleased to issue a Call for Presenters for the 41st Annual Training Institute to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, August 28-31, 2016. The underlying goal of this training institute is to provide participants with workshop opportunities that emphasize skill-building, increase relevant competencies and enhance overall career development. Because of this, preference will be given to workshop proposals that provide evidence of skill-building for participants (i.e., activities, audience participation, practicing new skills) as well as significant knowledge enhancement and new research for the field of community corrections.

Institute participants include community supervision personnel, the judiciary, treatment providers, criminal justice researchers and others who are interested in the field of community corrections (pretrial, probation, parole and community programming).

For this Training Institute, we will feature workshops that spotlight the concept of “Getting ahead of the curve: community corrections in the future”. What is your agency doing now to be ready for the next decade? What are your expected challenges and how do you plan to overcome them? Is your client base changing now and what will it look like in the near future? Are you adequately funded? If not, how do you change that?

Suggested topics may include, but are not limited to:

- o Succession Planning
- o Community Partnerships
- o Information Sharing
- o Supervising the Elderly
- o Mass Decarceration/Mass Supervision
- o Specialized Assessment Tools
- o Future of Supervision Technology
- o Staff Retention



Other presentations should relate to one or more of the following topics:

- **Community Supervision** (Agency operations and supervision or decision-making for those who are to be or have been released from prison, are under court jurisdiction in lieu of prison or jail; involving case planning; assessments; reporting; interventions.)
- **Gender Issues and Diversity** (Addresses supervising and/or working with individuals with various gender identities as well as multi-cultural and multi-generational workforces.)
- **Health and Safety** (Safety for professionals in the field and office in addition to stress management and vicarious trauma.)
- **International** (Community corrections issues including but not limited to advancing practices; administrative/policy innovations; juvenile and family justice innovations; restorative justice; and behavioral health from an international standpoint.)
- **Judicial** (Community corrections professionals working within a court system and policies; procedures of courts and specialty courts.)
- **Juvenile Justice** (Issues; programs; policies dealing with individuals under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.)
- **Leadership and Management** (Professional development for executive and middle management.)
- **Local Issues** (Programs and policies specific to an agency or geographical area; state; jurisdiction in proximity to the Institute site.)
- **Mental Health and Substance Abuse** (Working with individuals with mental health or substance abuse issues; promising treatment.)
- **Pretrial** (Agency operations and/or the supervision of defendants prior to trial or court adjudication or on diversionary status.)
- **Prevention** (Lowering recidivism; programs to prevent crime and re-offending; restorative justice.)
- **Reentry** (Planning and programming for individuals released from prisons, jails or residential placement.)
- **Research/EBP** (Presentation of data collection and analysis, evidence-based practices outcomes and programs.)
- **Technology** (Tools used for supervision; monitoring; testing.)
- **Victims' Issues, with Focus on Human Trafficking** (Working with victims; restitution; offenders as victims; Prison Rape Elimination Act; Human Trafficking Prevention Act.)

The above-suggested topics are not all-inclusive. Other topics related to the field of community supervision and corrections are acceptable.

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SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

Persons interested in submitting a proposal for consideration must provide the following information needed to comply with APPA training accreditation requirements and to apply for permission to grant contact hours credit to a variety of professions (i.e., Social Workers, Substance Abuse Counselors, Continuing Legal Education, etc.):

Length of Workshop: 90 minutes (workshops held on Monday, August 29 and Tuesday, August 30).

Sunday and Wednesday Sessions: 4 to 8 hour sessions (to be held on Sunday, August 28) and 90 minute sessions (to be held on Wednesday, August 31).

Workshop Title: A snappy title that catches the attention of participants and identifies the primary focus of the workshop (APPA reserves the right to change or adjust the title of a workshop).

Workshop Description: A clear, concise, accurate description of the workshop as it will appear in the program (no more than 150 words) (APPA reserves the right to change the construct of a workshop description).

Training/Learning Objectives: Describe the measurable skills, knowledge and/or new capacity the participant will gain as a result of workshop (i.e., at the end of the training, participants will be able to list five of 10 causes of suicide.). List a minimum of three training/learning objectives.

Activity: Please describe any activities that will be used in the presentation. The activity will not be listed in the program, but will assist with program selection. Preference will be given to presentations that are skill-based in nature (i.e., participants will be asked to complete a group activity to discuss potential steps to implement 'x, y, z program' at their home agency.), or that present new research relevant to the field of community corrections.

Faculty Information: Provide name, title, agency, address, phone and email for all proposed faculty. Submissions lacking any of this information will not be considered. Panel presentations should consist of no more than two or three persons; however, a fourth can be added as a moderator.

Resume or Vitae: Include brief resume or vitae of each faculty member.

Primary Contact: Submit name and complete contact information (including email address) for person submitting workshop proposal.
