## Enforcing Underage Drinking Laws: A Focus on Probation Outreach Strategies

The judicial and probation systems are important elements in any community system designed to reduce underage drinking and its consequences; yet, these systems each face unique concerns and challenges when working with offenses related to underage drinking. APPA is partnering with Pacific Institute for Research and Evaluation (PIRE) on a project funded by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention designed to develop outreach strategies that can help judicial and probation systems in the development of a coordinated and integrated response to enforcing underage drinking age laws and working with underage drinking offenders more effectively.

## How to Lead a Horse to Water So He Wants to Drink – Motivational Interviewing

Frustrated because your clients won't take your advice about making positive change in their lives? Often, people can be simultaneously attracted to and repulsed by a behavior which helps explain why they may feel two ways about changing it. Motivational Interviewing (MI) helps people explore their behaviors and resolve their ambivalence which can lead to lasting change. Participants will be exposed to MI principles and practice. This workshop will address how Arizona probation officers have responded to the challenge of thinking about behavioral changes in the context of evidence based practices.
