## APPA Executive Director/CEO Veronica Cunningham is Recognized by a Massachusetts Court during Women's History Month celebration

Veronica B. Cunningham, Executive Director/Chief Executive Officer of the American Probation and Parole Association (APPA) was one of seven influential women who were honored during Chelsea District Court's Second Annual Women's History Month Celebration, a virtual event staged at the Chelsea Court in Massachusetts last week. The theme of the event and national observance is "Women Providing Healing, Promoting Hope."

Ms. Cunningham is a trained Community Corrections professional with 36 years of experience "in extensive management and leadership in progressively responsible justice system positions." She and the other six honorees were acknowledged for their work and how it represents healing and hope. The award recipients work in the criminal justice, social service, and health care fields. that we have to make such a profound impact on the communities that we serve."

Ms. Cunningham told the virtual audience: "I'm so appreciative of this honor and I am more than thrilled to be a part of a conversation with such esteemed individuals." She also spoke about the importance of having a "bedrock" or support system and the power of the theme, "Women Providing Healing, Promoting Hope."
